February 2, 1848 - The war between the U.S. and Mexico ended with the signing of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. In exchange for \$15 million, the U.S. acquired the areas encompassing parts or all of present day California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, and Texas. The treaty was ratified on March 10, 1848.

February 4, 1861 - Apache Chief Cochise was arrested in Arizona by the U.S. Army for raiding a ranch. Cochise then escaped and declared war, beginning the period known as the Apache Wars, which lasted 25 years.

February 3, 1865 - A four-hour peace conference occurred between President Abraham Lincoln and Confederate Vice President Alexander Stephens at Hampton Roads, Virginia. The meeting was unsuccessful as President Lincoln insisted there could be no armistice until the Confederates acknowledged Federal authority. The Confederates wanted an armistice first. Thus the Civil War continued.

February 3, 1870 - The 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, guaranteeing the right of citizens to vote, regardless of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

## 22% Indians in Britain's ultra-rich club

Super-rich Indians account for more than 20% of the wealth of Ultra-High Net Worth (UHNW) individuals in Britain, a new list showed on Tuesday. As a national group, they are second only to expat Russians. The list, published by the Singapore-based Wealth-X group, places steel magnate and Arcelor Mittal Chairman Lakshmi Mittal at second place with a fortune of \$15.8 billion. Mittal was pushed to the second spot this year by Russian Alisher Burkhanovich Usmanov, who is part owner of the English football club Arsenal and is worth \$16.4 billion.

"Mittal has seen his net worth estimate decline along with the stock price of Arcelor Mittal, losing at least \$30 billion in recent years," the report said.

The two other Indians on the



top 15 list are the Hinduja brothers Srichand at number 9 with a net worth of \$7.6 billion and Gopichand at 12th with \$6 billion.

Taken together, the wealth of the three Indian-origin industrialists makes up 22% of the top 15 total of \$133.3 billion.

Apart from Usmanov, the two other Russians in the list include Roman Abramovich (at number 3, \$12.1 billion) and Leonard Blavatnik (Number 5, \$9.5

billion).

According to Wealth-X estimates, there are 10,760 individuals residents in Britain worth \$30 million or more, with at least 310 new individuals joining the ranks of the ultra wealthy. "The wealth composition of the United Kingdom, London in particular, is diverse," said David Lincoln, Director of Research at Wealthin our data showing that 31% of the UHNW population in the United Kingdom is considered non-domiciled, with non-resident Indians and West Asian UHNWIs making up a significant proportion of these."

an embryo and a corresponding bit of tissue known as endosperm that feeds the embryo as the seed grows.

They compared the growth and behavior of the embryos and endosperm in seeds sharing the same mother and father with the growth and behavior of embryos and endosperm that had genetically different parents.

"The results indicated embryos with the same mother and father as the endosperm in their seed weighed significantly more than embryos with the same mother but a different father," said Professor Pamela Diggle, a faculty member in CU-Boulder's ecology and evolutionary biology department.
