Is the father the only 'natural guardian' of a child? Can a court appoint a mother as guardian during the father's lifetime?

fitness specialist, to be guardian of her daughter, said, "The child has been with the mother for the last eight years and she is already nine years old. Even

Considering the crucial age of the child, this court is of the view that it is just and that the child should grow in the custody of the mother."

Answering these questions, and rejecting the argument that a mother can only be a custodian and not guardian of a child, the Madras high court has rejected an India-born US citizen's claim that his right to be the guardian of his nine-year-old daughter



could not be disturbed, as under the Guardians and Wards Act.

during the pendency of the case, the child was only with the mother. The minor child also expressed her desire to be with her mother.

The couple, after their marriage in November 2000, settled in the US. The child was born in November 2004. They divorced in 2007, after the woman settled in Chennai. In 2009, she obtained a separate divorce from a sub-court.

The court however, upheld the visitation rights of the father.

# India no to UN motion banning death penalty

## 110 Nations Support Resolution

India was among the 39 countries that voted against a UN General Assembly draft resolution which called for abolishing the death penalty, saying every nation had the “sovereign right” to determine its own legal system. The non-binding resolution called for a moratorium on executions with a view to

abolishing the death penalty. It was adopted on Monday at the General Assembly's Third Committee, which deals with social and humanitarian issues.

The draft resolution calls on nations to progressively restrict the death penalty's use and not impose capital punishment for offences committed by persons under age

18 or pregnant women, after 110 nations voted in favour of the resolution while 36 abstained. Among the nations voting against the resolution were Bangladesh, China, Korea, Iran, Iraq, Japan, Kuwait, Libya, Pakistan and the US.

## Rarest of rare norm for death penalty too judge-centric: SC

More than 32 years after it devised the “rarest of rare” criterion to restrict imposition of death penalty to exceptionally heinous and cold-blooded murder cases, the Supreme Court on Tuesday said the standard was being applied differently by different judges and needed to be looked at afresh.

In fact, the bench seemed to even concede that categorizing crimes the basis for ranking them and assessing which all meet the “rarest of rare” standard might be difficult. In short, the court suggested that the present system was not working.

# Plastic ban to begin with carry bags only

## Agencies To Monitor Big Stores First, Come Down Hard On Manufacturers From

The ban on plastic bags will finally be imposed in the city on November 23 but for the time being, only carry bags will be prohibited. The ban, notified in October,

says that no person shall manufacture, import, store, sell or transport any kind of plastic bag in the area that makes up the National Capital Territory (NCT) of Delhi. It stipulates that no person, including a shopkeeper, vendor, wholesaler, retailer, trader and hawker, shall sell or store or use any kind of plastic carry bag for storing or dispensing eatables or non-eatable goods or materials.

However, in the absence of viable alternatives, government officials said that they cannot clamp down on packaging material and will only start with carry bags. "Nothing is likely to change overnight but this time we are hopeful that the ban will be more effective. More agencies

have been roped in to carry out raids and we will start by sole headache of the Delhi Pollution Control Committee.

### Backing for Ban

- The ban will be only on plastic carry bags for the time being
- Packaging material permitted
- It will apply uniformly to all parts of the city, including residential areas
- Manufacturing of plastic bags banned
- No plastic material will be permitted, including virgin plastic, biodegradable or non-woven variety
- Government will meet stakeholders this week to fine-tune the ban

making an example of big stores and shops to discourage others from using the bags," said an official from the environment department. Manufacturing of plastic bags will also come to a complete halt in the capital

from Friday. "This is one area where we will not allow any leniency. The manufacturers have gone to court with the issue but so far there are no directions, and we will proceed according to the law," said the official.

~~Plastic Bags~~

This is the second effort by the Delhi government to ban plastic bags. In its first attempt in 2009, it had failed to make any dent in the use of plastic bags as monitoring has been the

roped in. Certain segments like big stores will be monitored first. The idea is not to imprison or fine people, and we also do not want the law to turn into a tool for harassment of small vendors and shopkeepers," said a government official.

The earlier version of the ban had implied that no plastic bags, including packaging material was to be permitted. This included garbage disposal bags, carry bags without handles and plastic bags used in grocery stores for keeping spices and pulses. With no clear alternative in mind, the government will be holding a meeting with stakeholders to decide on the implementation of the ban.

"We have switched to bags without handles for selling meat but are still not sure whether this is permitted," said Firaq Qureshi, a meat seller in Shakoорpur. Others like Bhim Singh who runs a small dhaba in north Delhi have switched to plastic containers.

"It is slightly more expensive but so far we haven't had the need to hike prices. In the long run we may have to consider that option," he said.
