We bring to you the last famous words from four people that we think tasted success.

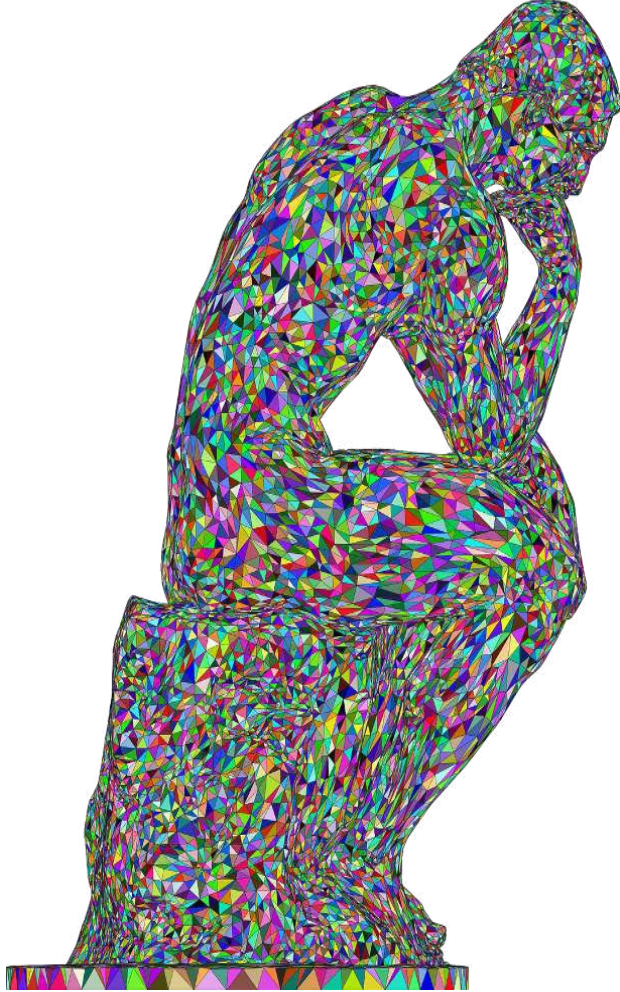

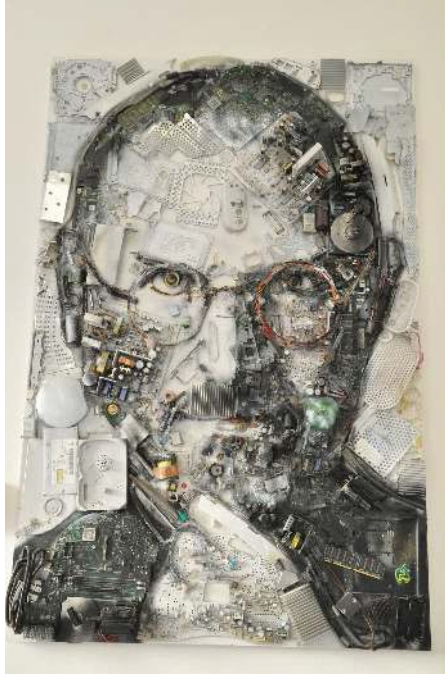
