- Involve the local community in literacy-related activities and initiatives

This event was organized by NSS Unit of Tecnia Institute of Advanced Studies, Rohini in Village Rajapur on the topic "Financial Literacy Awareness Campaign for Rural Women and students". The gender gap in the usage of bank accounts is still high as rural women lack financial literacy. Rural women tend to have minimal or no access to financial information and, coupled with lack of literacy, leave them unable to engage with banking services, especially when they are online and digital. For instance, rural women hesitate to visit physical bank branches as they feel uncomfortable in the male-dominated environment, while this might not be the case for rural men. Hence, the financial literacy programmes also need to factor in the importance of digital literacy to enable women to conduct their basic banking activities remotely, on their mobile phones.

The theme would highlight literacy learning from a lifelong learning perspective and therefore mainly focus on youth and adults. Literacy is a must for every citizen which can eradicate pandemic COVID 19 by spreading awareness. In a nutshell "Education is not preparation for life, education is life itself." Even in times of global crisis, efforts have been made to find alternative ways to ensure the continuity of learning, including distance learning, often in combination with inperson learning. Access to literacy learning opportunities, however, has not been evenly distributed. The rapid shift to distance learning also highlighted the persistent digital divide in terms of connectivity, infrastructure, and the ability to engage with technology, as well as disparities in other services such as access to electricity, which has limited learning options. The pandemic, however, was a reminder of the critical importance of literacy. Beyond its intrinsic importance as part of the right to education, literacy empowers individuals and improves their lives by expanding their capabilities to choose a kind of life they can value. It is also a driver for sustainable development. Literacy is an integral part of education and lifelong learning premised on humanism as defined by the Sustainable

Development Goal 4. Literacy, therefore, is central to a human-centered recovery from the COVID-19 crisis. "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world - Nelson Mandela".

Awareness Quiz was also conducted by NSS, 44 students participated from all the respective departments of TIAS on the online platform through Google forms. All the students who participated in the above-mentioned event have been distributed E Certificate through their Emails. It was observed that all the participants were keen to engage in such sought of activities. it provides different opportunities in their interests other than academic routine-based activities. The 8th of September was proclaimed International Literacy Day by UNESCO in 1966 to remind the international community of the importance of literacy for individuals, communities and societies, and the need for intensified efforts towards more literate societies. The issue of literacy is a key component of the UN's Sustainable Development Goals and the UN's 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.
